Peninsula kids head back to school

6600 students expected as local doors open

Already? It may seem hard to believe but summer is on its last legs and in a few days it will be time to get the kids back to school!

All Peninsula School District public schools will open for the 88-89 year on Wednesday, September 7, for a 181-day session ending in mid-June, 1989. Approximately 6,600 students will be in the system this year.

School Superintendent gives message for new school year

The 1988-89 school year is just about to begin. Teachers and students are excited about the new year. Many



teachers have attended summer school to stay up to date in their field and to acquire knowledge about the latest teaching techniques. Custodians, administrative staff, food service workers, transportation and clerical staff, as well as teachers, will be on the job to welcome an anticipated 6,640 students on September 7.


The Peninsula School Board has established goals for our schools which will guide us during this next year. Among these are the following: to monitor student mastery of the district's curricular objectives; to incorporate the development of communication skills, teamwork and interpersonal skills into the curriculum; to integrate the components of skillful thinking such as problem solving and decision making into our programs; to provide leadership in the community in coping with the emerging non-traditional family; to continue the emphasis on school based management and self study; to continue the improvements in in-service, instruction and employee evaluation; and to demonstrate sound governance, positive employee relations and prudent fiscal management in the district.

The school district will continue the emphasis on language and math skills this year for all students. Our high schools will begin the second year of our "math labs" and Integrated Mathematics in which algebra and geometry are taught in

Key Peninsula young people will be on their respective ways to three different elementary schools, one middle school or Peninsula High School (located across the Purdy Spit). Two of the elementary schools will start the year with major physical changes to the buildings. Students returning to Evergreen will find that their school has been almost entirely rebuilt, its' 30 year-old structure completely modernized and four new classrooms added. At Minter Creek Elementary, the changes will be the addition to ten new classrooms, fully integrated into the existing building structure. Vaughn elementary school is scheduled as an upcoming project in the Peninsula School District plans and will either be totally modernized or rebuilt under a different plan, subject to various studies and community discussion. All school construction projects are being done under a district-wide construction program funded through a bond election which passed about two years ago.

Parents who have recently moved to the Key Peninsula area should be aware that their children should be registered before the start of school and that various records of both previous schools and medical shots are required. Generally, Evergreen Elementary services a geographical "zone" from north of Home down to Longbranch. Vaughn School serves a zone from Evergreen's zone north to the Key Center area and west to Vaughn and on towards Rocky Bay. Minter Creek Elementary serves the north end of the Key Peninsula to the Purdy Spit. All local children in grades 6 to 8 may attend the Key Peninsula Middle School and all high school students, grades 9 to 12, may attend Peninsula High School.

For information including school zones, bus schedules, medical record requirements etc., parents may contact the local schools as listed elsewhere in the paper.

KPCCA news

At the August 11 board meeting of the Key Peninsula Civic Center Association Al Champlain of VFW Post 4990 reported on the July 4th fireworks sale at Key Center stating that a net of \$3,476.58 had been made and that a check for \$2,085.95, representing 60%, had been given to the Civic Center Association. The sale was extremely successful and the stand sold out 4 hours before the end of the 4th. Post Commander Jim Wooldridge suggested that, in view of the effort put into this event by the VFW, the future split between the two organizations should be

50/50; this was unanimously agreed upon by the Board.

KP NEWS editor Pauline Finn announced that Keith and Lee Stiles plan to withdraw from the paper at the end of this year in order to have more time to themselves, and that she also would like to plan on a similar move as soon as new staff can be found and trained. The Executive Committee was asked to start a search for replacements.

Ann Larson and Claudia Loy reported on the upcoming combined auction and dinner scheduled for October 1 with the theme "Flavor of Fall." There will be a no-host bar at 5:30 pm, dinner will be served at 7 pm and the auction will follow at 8 pm. Tickets will be \$35 a couple of which \$5 is an auction fee that can be applied against a successful bid. Dress will be cocktail attire. The general public will be invited to attend the auction at 8 pm, and there will be complimentary coffee during that event. Those making reservations for a table of eight or more for dinner will have a complimentary bottle of Washington wine provided at their table. Letters of invitation have gone out to about 75 businesses inviting them to donate to the auction.

The recent "Dance Your Socks Off" hop at the Civic Center was very popular and chairman Jerry Benoit is already planning another.

Pioneer Days '88 was reported on briefly by co-chairman Mike Salatino. Winners of the raffle held in conjunction with the celebration were: 1st prize - Ryan Falk of Vaughn; 2nd prize - Louise Oliver of Bremerton; and 3rd prize - Don Leslie of Tacoma.

conjunction with probability, logic and statistics. Spelling will be a focus for study and improvement in all grades. P.E., science, music, health, computers and vocational education will be other programs in which we will seek improvements.

Construction projects and maintenance work at many schools during the summer will improve the school climate and learning atmosphere for our students. All of the schools in the Key Peninsula area are receiving some improvements over the summer. Evergreen's remodeled classrooms will be ready for occupancy by the time school starts. The library portion of the building should be finished this fall. The ten-room addition at Minter Creek Elementary is complete and will be ready for new students. Vaughn will receive the attention of the maintenance staff in providing painting, ventilating and other improvements. Portable buildings will be moved to both Key Peninsula Middle School and Vaughn Elementary to house additional students and meet program needs. Site work and grounds care were completed at Peninsula High School this summer. In addition, a campus planning committee will be convened this fall to develop plans for the future of the schools and buildings on the Purdy campus.

We look forward to a continuing partnership with parents and patrons in all of our schools this next year. Parents have contributed so much to the quality of our programs and schools in the Peninsula School District. I hope that parents and members of the community will continue to participate in the full range of programs in our district this next year.

Your Park Board Reports

As residents of the Key Peninsula, we have been very fortunate to have two fine recreational facilities available for our use for many years. Many people feel we have taken them for granted because they have always been available, due in large to a huge volunteer force. These volunteers have always taken great pride in our district because they understand the importance of offering all residents a place to meet, hold community events and enjoy recreational sports of all types.

Because of the expense of operating and maintaining these facilities, the district has needed funding from levy in-

come. While the Park District Commissioners have been sensitive to the issue of additional taxation, the reality is that the gross rental income generated from the Civic Center and Volunteer Park do not total one third of the cost of providing utilities, fuel, caretaker's salary and maintenance of the two facilities.

I am asked from time to time how much the commissioners are paid. After I explain that we receive no compensation for our time I get a blank "You do this for nothing?" look. We may not receive monetary compensation but we receive something of far greater importance. All the commissioners put in countless hours of service to this community because we take great pride in the facilities this district offers the residents. For years we have reaped the benefits of living on the Key Peninsula, now it is our turn to give back to the community. We have chosen to do this by serving the Park District.

The commissioners have evaluated

the various sources of rental income to see if we could possibly increase our rental fees to generate additional revenue. While we increased the rents of those utilizing the facilities to generate their own income, we do not feel our clubs with non-profit status have the ability to pay additional rent.

We have so many worthwhile organizations which service a variety of interest and age groups. Would we have organizations for the seniors, cub scouts, boy scouts, brownies and those who participate in youth and adult sporting activities if we did not have the Civic Center and Volunteer Park? Would Hugh McMillan have been able to start the Citizens Against Crime organization if he did not have a facility to hold it in? How about the Lion's dinners where the money comes back into our community to benefit us in so many ways? What about all of us who enjoy the dances, Pioneer Days and candidate's forums? Where would the VFW and Auxiliary, Grange and Cootiettes meet? Where would the students from Evergreen Elementary have gone for P.E. while the school was being renovated if we did not have the Civic Center?

As you can see, this Park District offers so much to so many. While the

commissioners work to ensure we meet the recreational needs of as many residents as possible, we also work alongside those members of the Key Peninsula who continually strive to make our community a better place to live.



Home considered for historic designation

Pierce County Historical Planner Caroline Gallacci will explain, at the Key Peninsula Social Club September 6 meeting, the planning process by which Home may be designated an Historic District. Home would then take its place in the County and/or National Register of Historic Places. Pierce County's Department of Planning and Natural Resource Management has received a federal grant that will help the funding of the project. The district proposed will include the original plat of Home and the other side of the bay as far as Hoff Road and Von Geldern Cove Road.

Property owners within the bounda-

ries of the proposed district will be contacted, by mail, to express themselves on the proposed designation. Having one's home in an historic district places no requirements upon the owner. In some circumstances funding becomes available for restoration of historic homes. In addition, real estate taxes are stabilized for ten years when substantial rehabilitation occurs. If a restored house then becomes a rental house, the owner can take advantage of IRS rehabilitation tax credit.

Residents are invited to attend the presentation of the plan by Ms. Gallacci at the September 6 meeting at the Longbranch Church at 7:30 pm. The public is also invited to the hearing on the designation by the Pierce County Landmarks Commission. It will be held October 24 at 7 pm in the Brones Room of the Key Center Library.

To Your Health

One of the most misunderstood ailments that I commonly see in practice is shingles, or more specifically, herpes zoster. The name "shingles" is derived from the Latin "cingulus," meaning belt or zone, which describes the rash which is the hallmark of this disorder. Herpes zoster is caused by the same viral agent that carries chicken pox and could be described as a very late complication of chicken pox. There is now good evidence that after a child develops chicken pox the virus never goes away entirely but can remain dormant in the spinal nerve root for many years. The appearance of shingles is a reactivation of this dormant virus.

Herpes zoster usually begins with a low-grade fever and very localized pain, which can occur 3 to 5 days before the development of a rash. The rash of shingles is typically in a band 1/2 way around the trunk and very seldom crosses over the midline to the other side. It can also occur on the arms, neck and face but this is less common. The skin lesions are similar to those of chicken pox but last longer and often form a blackened scab before healing. The skin rash carries the virus so it is possible for a child to develop chicken pox from exposure to shingles, but it is not possible for an adult to develop shingles from exposure to a child's case of chicken pox.

Herpes zoster is usually a self-limited condition but can cause some long-lasting problems. The most common are those where the lesions affect the eye which can cause scarring and blindness or a condition called post hepatic neuralgia. Most adults will have some lingering discomfort even after the rash clears but occasionally there can be a severe pain which can last for years. There are currently medications available which may help prevent this state in those older than 60, so medical evaluation is recommended. Herpes zoster can also indicate an underlying severe medical condition, so if you develop symptoms consistent with shingles, you should see your health care provider.

Next month the Key Peninsula Health Center will present its fifth annual Health Fair on October 22, along with its kickoff of flu shot season. Mark your calendar and look for more information in the KP NEWS.

Tax Tips

A new Medicare tax has been created for the elderly - starting in 1989. Anyone eligible for Medicare hospital benefits must pay a Medicare tax of \$22.50 for every \$150 of federal income tax they owe. Maximum Medicare tax: \$800 for single filers and \$1,600 for married couples. More tax in the future: the Medicare tax rates are already scheduled to increase through the year 1993. The Medicare tax will reach \$42 for every \$150 of income tax. Maximum projected tax: \$1,050 for single filers and \$2,100 for couples.

Wrong answers from the IRS. A new study by the General Accounting Office shows that almost half of the time IRS answers to taxpayers' questions are incorrect, unresponsive, unclear or incomplete. Biggest problem: responses aren't tailored to the taxpayers' specific

inquiries. Background: IRS examiners select their responses from a catalog of about 500 computer-generated form letters. But they become familiar with only a small number of letters and use them repeatedly whether they are applicable or not.

Transferring income producing property to children under age 14. Parents who don't understand how the new kiddie tax works are making this mistake. They think they'll save taxes by transferring property to their kids. But if the child is under 14, the income from the property (over \$1,000) is taxed at the parents' tax rate, not the child's. The shrewdest investment for children under 14 is tax exempt bonds or investments such as US Savings Bonds on which tax can be deferred until the child is 14 or over and free of the kiddie trap.





Group meets to study hazards of Hwy 302

As previously announced, 7th District Pierce County Councilman Paul Cyr convened a meeting on Wednesday, August 24, in Key Center to consider what steps may be possible to make State Highway 302 less dangerous.

The meeting was essentially a review and planning session in preparation for a group meeting on September 13 with Washington State Department of Transportation officials, probably including Art Smelzer who is in charge of state highways in this part of Washington.

Those getting together in the August 24 meeting included Cyr, District 16 Fire Chief Horrace Kanno, Fred Ramsdell (representing District 16 EMS activities) and Cherie Mastro, representing the Key Peninsula Business Association. Among other issues, the group heard a report that there have been a total of 1,082 accidents on Highway 302 in the past eleven years. Cyr said the greatest number of these accidents have happened around 5 pm, the next greatest number happened around 2 pm, followed by accidents happening around 10 pm. December seemed to be the worst month for accidents, followed by May, then August. The largest number of accidents seemed to have happened in either clear or cloudy weather and on dry pavement.

According to Cyr, it is hoped that the September 13 meeting with representa-


tives of the State will produce some decisions on safety steps such as guard rails, shoulder work, more adequate signs and painting, reflectors etc. Officials have indicated to the NEWS that there is no money immediately available for major operations such as widening the road or moving it somewhere else.

Bates offers training for women

Bates Voc-Tech recently learned that its program to train and place 40 young women in career-track positions has been funded for the 1988-89 school year. Marilyn Walton has been hired to coordinate the program.

The program, "Work Plus," will provide job readiness training, on-the-job training, placement and follow-up for 40 economically disadvantaged women between 16 and 21 years old. The age and sex requirements are funding stipulations, meant to service that special needs population. Students accepted into the program will be paid while they learn, with pay increases coming after training is complete and they are placed in full-time positions. Some child care is available.

The training program is unique because of the level of public and private cooperation and because it offers remedial training, career development, job search and on-the-job training. "Work Plus" is funded through the Private Industry Council with Job Training Partnership Act funds. Interested people should call 591-5788 for details.
