KPPR M & O LEW FAILS!

A Maintenance and Operation (M & O) Levy for the Key Peninsula Park and Recreation District in an amount of \$89,000 fell short of being approved on March 10, 1981.

It was necessary to obtain a 60% majority of votes cast and this required 555 "yes" votes. Yes votes numbered 544 and No votes were 381. The levy would have been 50c per \$1,000 assessed valuation of property.

If the levy had been approved, revenues would have been used to maintain and operate both the Key Peninsula Civic Center, the Sports Center and a small capital expenditure to obtain recreational services in the newly annexed area of the district.

Walt Smith, Chairman of KPPR Board indicated the levy failure was due to three basic factors. He said, "a 60% affirmative vote requirement is very difficult to achieve, secondly, we are facing a conservative time and people are hesitant to spend any more money than necessary and thirdly, the position of the levy measure on the ballot itself was overlooked by many voters as the results of the votes cast for the Pierce County Executive Administrator had more than 100 votes than were cast for the levy measure."

Another levy will probably be placed on the ballot in November, Smith predicted. "We will just have to do a better job of communications next time and indicate the critical financial problems the Park District will encounter in 1982 and 1983,"

he concluded.


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

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Guard Your Credit Cards What would yo do if you lost your wallet and all the credit cards it contains? Worse yet, what would you do if your cards were stolen? Would you find yourself saddled with hefty bills accumulated by the perpetrator of the crime? A few simple precautions could help you avoid these kinds of headaches, advises Joanne Ross, Washington State University's Pierce County Extension Agent.

Mrs. Ross recommends maintaining an up-to-date list of all your cards. A copy of this list should be filed in a safe place at home and each member of your family who carries cards should carry a list when they travel. Of course, Mrs. Ross points out, this list should be kept separate from your cards.

Each card in your possession should be listed, along with a few pertinent details; your account number and the address and telephone number of the issuing companies.

Then, if you should lose your cards, you could report their loss by phone immediately. While you can be held responsible for yp to \$50 of unauthorized charges on each stolen card, any illegal charges made after you report their disappearance cannot be charged against you. In this case, time is money.

Cut your risk of loss even further by leaving infrequently used cards at home. Tuck them away in a safe place and withdraw them only when you need them.

You will reap an additional benefit, Mrs. Ross says. "You won't be tempted to use them to make impulse purchases."


He was one of the founders of the Vaughn Community Church and continued to be an active member. He was also on the Vaughn School Board for many years. He was a logger and a veteran of World War I.



LITTLE BY LITTLE

By now I assume all of you have received your tax statements and discovered an additional tax for noxous weed control. From what I've observed most of you have not been exactly happy about it.

Furious would be a better word for how I feel. Also frustrated. The amount of money is small, depending on the extent of your property; for my four pieces of property the total is just under thirteen dollars. For many of you it is less than five dollars. The article in the Gateway explained how this money was to be used - a large sprsy machine with a tankful of spray can be rented for one dollar. More spray will have to be bought by those needing it.

Many of us are very opposed to spraying and have been fighting it for years. We have lost our bees and hundreds of song birds. Spraying has killed much of the beautiful native growth along our highwaysferns, faxgloves, trilliums, etc. One half mile along the south Vaughn highway escaped the spray (perhaps the men doing the spraying didn't have the heart to spray such beautiful native plants). Last year for weeks it was a truly lovely sight when the foxglove was in bloom. I noticed several persons taking pictures - some were tourists and were eager to show friends in other parts of our country how beautiful Puget Sound country can be. I've been scattering seeds along the road for years - faxglove, columbine, lupine, etc. but it's very discouraging with the county working against us all the way.

Now for the nexious weeds, expecially Tansy Ragwort. For years I've been working on it and there are many others on the peninsula who have also been destroying every trace of it wherever they've found it. In the entire area near my home I know of just one clump of Tansy Ragwort - it's at Olman Point and has not spread. Since it's in a private garden I've hesitated about barging in and destroying it - but I'm keeping an eye on it. It doesn't

dare spread.

I've noticed horses do not eat Tansy if there's anything else available. Where are these sheep and cows that have the county board so worried? And why aren't the owners of these animals the ones who foot the bill?

The Vaughn Garden Club has written a letter to the county asking for a statement showing exactly how much money was taken in and exactly how it was spent. I'll publish it later if we get a reply from them.

Don't forget to caution children (and sometimes adults) not to pick the trilliums. They die if picked.

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
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
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EASTER REVEALS THE TRIUMPH OF LIFE OVER DEATH

"The Family Formula Book" by Cicely Nichols, published by Grosset and Dunlap in 1978.

> This book shows 500 easy ways to save money by making your own household products. It includes safe and easy-to-mix formulas for scaps and cleaners, polishes, fertilizers, insecticides, lotions, and

The chapters cover these areas; Caring for yourself and your family; The Foods you eat; In the House; Controlling household pests; In the Garden; Energy, Safety and Misc.; Arts and Crafts.

Some older people will chuckle when they read some of the formulas and suggestions because they were ones used in past generations and thrown out for newer (more expensive) sophisticated ones.

Here are some examples: Instant furniture polish -- use any light

medicinal or mineral lubricating oil. Apply with a soft cloth and polish with another clean one. Or, to prevent cabbage cutworms, fit a tarpaper collar around each stem to prevent worm from laying eggs there; or, make-shead dry mixes in quantity for bread, cakes, cookies, etc. for economy and convenience.

This book will make interesting reading for everyone, even if you don't experiment with all their suggestions.



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

SENIOR/DISABLED TRANSPORT TO TACOMA

The Key Peninsula Senior
Society is now running its six
passenger van to Tacoma on Mondays
and Fridays for seniors and handicapped. Mail stops will be at the
Tacoma Community College Bus Transfer Station (across from James
Center) and at Tacoma Mall. The
Transfer Station connects with the
Tacoma/Pierce County Bus System.

In addition to the schedule above, the van will make limited special stops when requested in previous week reservations. Such stops could be at points on route such as Wauna and Purdy, or to the Gig Harbor Senior Center or downtown Gig Harbor.

As vans are driven by volunteer licensed drivers, the initial schedules are limited, however extended schedules will be added as the service develops and as more volunteers are available.

The van will be based at the Key Peninsula Health Clinic and will leave that point at 9:00 AM on Mondays and Fridays. By reservation, (see below), pick ups of seniors or handicapped can be made at Longbranch Store, Vaughn, Rocky Bay, or at the passenger's home.

There is no required fare for the transportation; however, donations to operation fund are welcomed as the van gasoline and maintenance must be supplied by the Senior Society which is supported by member donations. It now costs more than 25c per mile to drive a medium size car -- about \$20.00 to Tscoma and back. A van donation is not required.

The return trip will leave from the Gollege Transfer Station at 3:00 PM (earlier from the Mall), in order to avoid traffic.

Reservations for transportation must be made during the week in advance of the ride. This may be done by calling the Pierce County Community Action office at Vaughn

884-4440 between 10:00 AM and 2:00 PM Monday through Friday. Without reservations in advance, rides are on a "space available" basis at the Clinic base.

The Friends will use the proceeds to pay for a display case for the new library or decorative windows for the building.




The Skirts-N-Flirts Square

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
