

### Post office is named

Local residents concerned about the Wauna post office situation can now relax. Postal authorities have handled the situation. After holding a series of committee meetings and carefully studying the county's handling of street addresses, they have come up with a name that truly has something for everyone, and they are confident that no one can possibly take issue or be inconvenienced or confused.

The News has learned that the selection came down to an agonizing decision, but in the end, the name "Whaddya Wauna," Washington, even though it preserved the Indian heritage and tonal qualities, might, it was felt, create some confusion about the actual location. The postal authorities feel that the final choice, and new name for the new post office, preserves everything and eliminates any possible confusion about where the post office actually is, and where its customers actually live. In just a few months, service will begin from the new post office, and all the residents can begin enjoying their new, improved address: "Wauna on the Key Peninsula at Lake Kathryn Village, but not in Gig Harbor, Washington." The zip code will be decided at a later date.

## Pierce County to build Peninsula branch office

In a move to develop better relationships with rural residents, Pierce County will be opening a branch office in downtown Key Center. Residents will be able to pay property taxes, obtain building permits, make appointments for inspections or conduct any other county business. In an effort to improve services, the office will be open 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. There will also be a drive-up window, so that tired people trying to get records straightened out need not even leave their car. And speaking of errors, under the new "our fault" policy, any errors made by the county entitle the property holder to a choice of: no property taxes for one year or 10 free throws at the employee of their choice in the county dunk-em tank, which will be a permanent part of the branch office. The dunk-em tank will be available to loan to school carnivals and Pioneer Day celebrations, complete with an employee.

Construction of the new office will be funded by a special tax levy on all the rest of the county residents.

We are among the "few" who have a Gig Harbor address. Obviously, Mrs. Evans does not realize just how many homes are affected by this... half of Key Center, Highway 302, Minterwood, Minter, Wright Biss road (to County Line road) Elgin Clifton road, Lake Holiday, Lake of the Woods through to Lake Kathryn. Furthermore, we cannot list all roads affected but we do assure you, Mrs. Evans, it is not just a few with an "identity" problem. We are luckier than some, we have KPN (Key Peninsula North) attached to our address, but many have NW (Northwest). This leads to a lot of confusion as you may well imagine. Delivery people and out-of-town guests find it very difficult and confusing. If by some chance our mail cannot be delivered, we personally have a 32-mile round trip just to pickup our mail; a little different from

a couple of miles, don't you agree?

About three years ago we did circulate a petition to have our post office changed to the Vaughn post office. Even though many signatures were obtained, we were told that we would have to have a 100% response. Have you ever tried for a 100% response to anything?

We personally do not think that Lakebay or Longbranch should be changed at all. Please, people, let us who live on this wonderful Key Peninsula be part of it, not Gig Harbor. Would Lakebay, Longbranch or Vaughn dare ask to be like Gig Harbor???? We seriously doubt it. Now that a new post office is being built at Lake Kathryn, why not tie us in with it and maybe call it the Key Peninsula Post Office. We really feel that this could be an ideal way to solve our problem.

Furthermore, Mrs. Evans, we just do not see where post office bashing comes into this matter at all; this is simply a survey or public opinion poll for an address change.

## It's Census time

If you haven't done so already, be sure to complete and mail your census form when it arrives in your mail. Census data is used to provide population counts needed to apportion seats in the U.S. House of Representatives and determine state legislative districts boundaries.

Census data gives valuable information used in federal programs so that compliance with the Voting Rights Acts and amendments can be determined, federal grant funds can be allocated, areas needing bilingual education and areas needing energy assistance can be identified, the need for equal employment opportunity programs can be assessed, programs to reduce unemployment can be developed and areas needing programs to stimulate economic growth can be identified, to name a few.

State and local government programs use census data to prepare redistricting plans for state legislatures and local governments.

## Cootiettes - women who serve with grace and humour

The name is based on a wry joke. Men returning from World War I had to be de-loused because of conditions in the trenches. When these veterans later formed a service organization, they called the group the Order of the Cooties, cooties being another word for lice. A later women's service organization, using the same joke, christened themselves the Cootiettes.

Every second, third and fourth Tuesday, the local chapter of the Cootiettes meets by the hardware store in Key Center to carpool. One Tuesday they go to the Naval Hospital in Bremerton, the next to Cottesmore Nursing Home in Tacoma, and the next to the Washington Veterans' Home in Retsil. The Cootiettes also make regular visits to the Rocky Bay health care facility.

On this particular Tuesday, the destination is Retsil. Alice Palmer, Helen Wolniewicz, Cathy Schafer, Judy Wilson and Pauline Williamson first check to see if everyone has brought enough cakes; the group always brings baked goods to whomever they are visiting. The next decision the group makes is where to go to eat.

"We're an eating group," laughs Alice Palmer, "we always have to eat." After some discussion, the group proceeds to The Flotation Device in Purdy. The mostly working-man lunch crowd looks with some curiosity at the women in their white outfits and colorful red vests emblazoned with a variety of pins and appliques.

The officer's vests have a large gray

louse embroidered on the back with a title like "head louse" or "lady louse" stitched underneath. All of the women either themselves served in the armed forces, as in Judy Wilson's case, or had a relative - father, brother or husband - in the services.

The reason for the group's existence is simply to help others. Cootiettes are dedicated to help anyone who needs it, most particularly veterans. White appliqued hands on the shoulders of some members' vests symbolize the idea of helping hands.

After lunch, they proceed to Retsil. The Washington Veterans' home at Retsil was built in 1910 when the state recognized the needs of war veterans who could no longer support themselves or who might be carrying physical and emotional scars. Today the home is a sprawling, well kept cluster of buildings designed to suit the varied needs of the men and women who reside there. The Cootiettes are familiar visitors to the staff and residents; "Hi, ladies," several of them call out.

The Tuesday afternoon bingo game is already underway, and the Cootiettes begin slicing the cakes they have brought and serving coffee. They also help residents play their bingo cards, if necessary. The women laugh and joke with the residents through the afternoon, while being attentive to anyone who needs assistance at the same time. It is another day in the many days of kindness and service that the Cootiettes are dedicated to.



an hour. There was even speculation that horse powered boats might supplant steam.

The horse and/or man power was transmitted to a capstan or a rotating platform connected by gears to a longitudinal shaft beneath the deck. This shaft was geared to a paddlewheel at the stern, the rotation of which propelled the boat. There was even a reverse in some cases, operated by a sliding gear, similar to modern outboard reverse gears. In all the years I have observed boats of many kinds here on Puget Sound, I have never seen a horse powered one. Are we so backward, I wonder?

Now we come to the main purpose of this article: The first demonstration of a horse powered airplane is due to be made in this area soon. 





**Tax Tips**

Refund loans are growing. Loans from banks and other institutions based on anticipated refunds will be much more common this year. How they work: The lender files an individual's return electronically with the IRS, then provides a loan secured by the claimed refund. The individual gets cash without having to wait for the refund to arrive. IRS warning: such a loan is not an early refund, it's a loan for which the lender charges as any other lending institution would.

Point of interest: The IRS tax processing system is "falling apart," and "will collapse if urgent steps aren't taken

soon," says IRS Assistant Commissioner David Blattner, who also says that the fact that the system still works is a miracle. Key problems: of the IRS's 16,000 processing agents, 9,000 have less than 2 1/2 years' experience...there's no money in the IRS budget to equip them...and the law is "just too complex" for them to handle.

A word of advice to you: seek out experienced tax persons to prepare your income taxes. Those with little experience are not equipped to do the job if there is something unusual in your return. The consensus of opinion in the tax and accounting industry is - get a second or even third opinion from your fellows in the tax business. Don't let this time of year become too taxing.



# To Your Health

disease category of Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease which, up until the AIDS epidemic, constituted the fastest growing cause of death in the United States.

Emphysema affects literally millions of adults, almost all of them smokers. The person usually starts showing symptoms in the sixth decade of life.

Shortness of breath, especially with exertion, accompanied by a chronic cough are the most common symptoms.

Men often become barrel chested in the late stages, and pulmonary sounds heard with the doctor's stethoscope become different and muted.

At the late stages the patient develops dyspnea (shortness of breath) at rest, changes in skin color, and a classic "tripod" pose; leaning forward, supporting his chin with his elbows on the table, with pursed lip breathing.

The most useful laboratory tests are Pulmonary Function Testing, where the patient blows into a machine to determine lung capacity and rate of air exchange.

A fairly simple test you can try at home is called the "match test." The patient tries to blow out a lit match placed six inches from his open mouth by saying the word "hoh." Failure to extinguish the match can indicate a significant decrease

in the maximal rate of air exchange.

Once emphysema is diagnosed, the cessation of smoking is the most important factor—it's never too late.

Medications to improve breathing have some value, and it is important to prevent or treat lung infections before major problems develop. An exercise program is also of benefit and, finally, supplemental oxygen often becomes necessary.

If you have any questions about yourself, try the match test. If you fail, it's probably time for further testing at your doctor's office.

It always surprises me when cigarette smokers are amazed to learn they have emphysema.

Virtually everyone who has smoked for thirty years will have it to some degree. Emphysema, along with chronic bronchitis and asthma, comprise the

# Inspect Chimneys!

The Key Peninsula Fire Department reports that there have been nine chimney fires on the peninsula since the first of January 1990. Chimney fires only occur if chimneys have not been inspected and/or cleaned.

Inspect your chimney regularly. Clean it as often as necessary. If you are unsure of how to inspect or clean your chimney, get a professional chimney-sweep to handle the job. There are several good chimneysweeps in our area who are trained and certified to do the work. A few dollars spent on their services now could spare you the enormous expense of losing your home and all your belongings.....even your own, or someone else's life.

Burn only dry, seasoned wood. Keep your fire under control; too hot can cause ignition outside the fire box; too low will cause incomplete combustion and creosote buildup.

Keep anything that can burn away from the fireplace, insert, or wood stove. Check walls and ceilings; if they're hot, there's danger. Don't burn trash or garbage. Never use flammable liquids. Have a fire extinguisher handy. Install a smoke detector properly and keep it in good working order. Have and practice an escape plan with all members of your family.

Visit our Headquarters Fire Station in Key Center to obtain a copy of an excellent booklet, "About Wood Stove Safety." It's free.

Finally, if you have an emergency or even suspect one, dial 911. You are paying for our protection, but we can't help you unless you tell us that you have a problem. And Please! Do NOT try to handle it yourself. We are the professionals. We can handle it expertly.

# Plant a tree for Arbor Day

We take trees for granted, especially here in western Washington. Tree roots grip and hold the topsoil. When trees are removed, erosion often results because the tree roots are no longer available to hold the soil in place. The sediment washes into the stream and can be harmful to fish habitat. Leafy tree canopies cool the hot summer sun, conserve moisture, slow the wind, keep the air clean and help quiet loud traffic noises. Trees create a welcome home for birds and wildlife.

After our very rainy January, ours is the ideal area which could benefit from tree plantings. This year, as has been done for the past several years, the Pierce County Conservation District is making

hybrid poplar whips and douglas fir seedlings available to landowners at a very reasonable price.

The available hybrid poplar whips are dormant, unrooted cuttings, approximately 3 to 4 feet long. The hybrid poplars have many uses - such as supplying a quick growing pulpwood crop, firewood production, streambank protection and serve as windbreaks.

Also available this year are two year old, field-grown douglas fir rooted seedlings. The seedlings are approximately 10 to 26 inches in height. They were grown in western Washington, and are well adapted to local micro-climates.

The hybrid poplar whips are 35¢ each and the douglas fir seedlings are 30¢ each. For more information or to receive an order blank, please call the District at 536-2945. We will be accepting orders until our supply is exhausted, so order as soon as possible.

# Science Corner

In the February issue of the Journal of Inexplicable Results, a number of scientific discoveries were reported that could dramatically affect the quality of life here on the Peninsula.

Doctor Harold Bugbinder from the State University at Fools' Gold, Minnesota, having received some specimens of carpenter ants from the Pacific Northwest discovered some alarming effects of pesticides on these insects. ## When to prune

Roses: Approximately mid-March. (Uh-oh.) Pruning can be done a little earlier in metropolitan areas and a couple weeks later in the lower mountain communities.

Spring-flowering Plants (Forsythia, Spirea, etc.): Right after their normal flowering season.

Rhododendrons: Immediately after they have finished flowering; they can also be pruned during the winter. Camellias and azaleas should also be pruned after spring flowering time.

## Spring chinook sport season

Washington Department of Fisheries Director Joe Blum has approved a spring Chinook sport salmon season on several Columbia River tributaries above Bonneville Dam. The season includes salmon angling opportunities on the Wind, Little White Salmon (Drano Lake), and Klickitat Rivers, recently negotiated with tribal managers from the Yakima Nation.

Fisheries biologists from the Yakima Nation and WDF will closely monitor spring Chinook runs to the Yakima River. If the run is sufficient, an emergency opening may be announced in late May. The Yakima River has not been open to spring Chinook angling for approximately 25 years.



## razor clam season opens

The Washington Department of Fisheries will open a spring razor clam season Sunday, April 1. Scheduled to run through Sunday, April 29, the season will allow digging on odd-numbered days and only during morning tides (midnight to noon).

Plans formulated by various local governments and put into action by the Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission will close portions of Washington's ocean beaches to vehicular traffic from April 15 to the day after Labor Day, except during clam digging hours.

Clam harvesters also are reminded of the 15-clam limit designed to protect the resource. Diggers must keep the first 15 clams dug regardless of size or condition. The Department also reminds diggers that razor clam licenses are required. These are available at all WDF license outlets.

## Goin' Out

A new trend in restaurants is sweeping the nation, and it seems that Key Peninsula will be the first on the West Coast to have one of these new eateries.

"You buy - we fly" is one of the mottoes of the Porker Chopper Flying Restaurant. Owners Jake and Madge

Porcine feel that the Key Peninsula is the perfect place to introduce their new concept because of our many small, narrow dirt roads that would prevent a franchise such as Dominoes Pizza from delivering to homes here.

Just as they cover all remote areas on Key Peninsula they will cover all cuisines in porkdom. Features of the "ultra lite" menu will include Pork Fried Rice, Pork Normandy (a French dish with apples, cream and apple jack), Boudin Blanc Gumbo (Cajun sausage stew), pork chops with potato dumplings and sauerkraut (German style) and, of course, sweet and sour pork (Chinese) and many other cuisines of the world.

It seems quite an ambitious menu for a small new operation but as noted on the menu, "Let Huey Helo Help Your Hunger" is the couple's motto. "We cover the Key Peninsula with Pork" is a local slogan for the Porker Chopper.

Another of Jake and Madge's innovations is a tumbling salad mixer. As they lower an order by rope to designated clients, they pour "Air-Born" dressing over the salad in a special plastic (disposable) container that tumbles as it drops, thus thoroughly combining the salad and dressing. Madge advised that clients need not be concerned for those rare cases when the salad lands in inaccessible places; "the container is biodegradable," she said.

Jake, the pilot of the partnership, is a romantic. Once the complete dinner has been delivered, he leans out of the 'copter so patrons can see his white silk scarf, dark goggles and old-fashioned leather helmet. He then drops a single red rose to the patrons below. An irate customer complained that he was hit in the eye by a "very sharp flower stem and I'm thinking of suing those bird brained chopper poppers." Most women find the "Red Baron" gesture charming.



Another small glitch concerning the Porker Chopper is voiced by K.P. Fire Department spokesman Boris Connough who advises that the Porker Chopper practice of dropping flares to signal its arrival is causing concern among firefighting personnel. The next edition of the Key Peninsula News should report further on this.

Details of a Porker Chopper contest for the most unusual roof decoration using pork as a theme are forthcoming. The prize will be two free gourmet pork dinners. Reknowned New York restaurateur Morris Goldberg of Chez Kosher and the celebrated Rasjhid Ali Khan of the Aswan Kadota Fig Combine will be judges. Specifics are not yet worked out and the Porcines solicit your suggestions.

The restaurant will operate from 4 p.m. until 10:30 p.m. every day, weather permitting. Prices are \$25.00 per person, delivered, naturally.
