## GROUND-BREAKING FOR LIBRARY-HEALTH CLINIC

A ground breaking ceremony was held at Key Center, Gig Harbor-Longbranch Highway, on Monday, October 6, at 10:00 a.m. to launch construction of the area's new Pierce County Library/Key Peninsula Health Clinic Complex.

Representative Norm Dicks, 6th Congressional District, spoke at the event, and various citizens, officials, and representatives of involved agencies and contractors attended. Mr. Dicks said he was proud to have such a facility soon to be available in our area and that it was a step toward bringing many services out to the community rather than centralized in urban areas.

Ken Stiles, representing, the Friends of the Key Peninsula Library, spoke of this project being the culmination of almost a century of community interest in a library facility. The first library at Vaughn was opened in a home in 1893 and the library built in 1898.

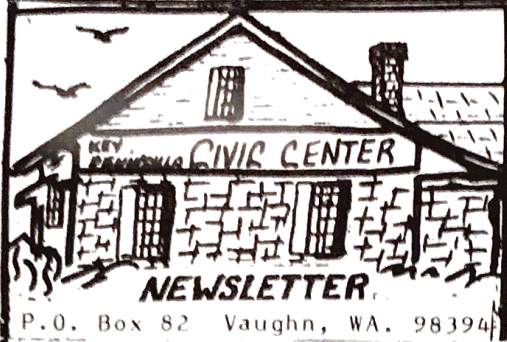

**LAND USE PLANNING MEETING**

The meeting on land use planning for the Key Peninsula held on Oct. 22 in the Gold Room of the Civic Center at Vaughn, was very well attended. The seats were full and many people were standing. The purpose of this meeting was to clear up some questions of fact and allow expressions of opinion of all types.

The meeting opened with Randy Carr outlining the origin of the informal committee which has been gathering information. This was at the request of the Park Board. He then mentioned that early meetings had been publicly announced and a questionnaire paid for in the Civic Center News Letter. A summary of these answers was posted. Negative replies gave two major reasons: 1. the right of land owners to do as they pleased with their property and 2. there are already enough or too many regulations. Positive replies were more varied but centered around the need for reasonably slow and planned growth to preserve what most people value in the area.

There were a number of references to this meeting as a "Town Meeting" and a desire for more of them. There was a strong vote to hold another general meeting with authorities present to answer questions on planning possibilities. The time and place will be announced in the Gateway and with posters in the stores. It was suggested that this be followed by small, precinct-type meetings in which very detailed discussions could take place. Only after this can some method be devised for getting a true picture of the wishes of the majority of the community.

It was pointed out that if the people of the Peninsula expend their energies fighting each other, that the state and county rather than the local people will be the ones who will do the planning.

- B. Care at the Center is covered by Medicare, Medicaid, Pierce County Medical and other private medical insurance companies. We will assist you in filling out forms for reimbursement.
- C. A physician is present at the Center one-half day each week to provide on-site consultation. Consultation with other physicians is utilized on an as-needed basis.
- D. The Health Center is a community controlled facility. It is also a community supported facility. As the community increases the use of the services of the Center, the operating costs can be met and the lower-than-average fees can be maintained. **CANDIDATE SPEAKS OUT**

Dan Dawson discussed his major concerns for this area with the Newsletter staff. One of these is improved law enforcement on the Key Peninsula. As Chairman of the House Insurance Committee he set up a task force to produce facts on existing conditions and this is what he found:

Only 6% of all car accidents in this state occur on freeways but 90% of the State Patrol staff is located on these freeways to enforce the national 55 mile per hour speed limit. This means that the outlying areas that have the most accidents are the least protected.

He also found that 5% of the Washington drivers are uninsured and they are involved in 25% of all accidents most of these off the freeways, away from protected areas. He suggests appeal to Congress to relocate state patrolmen.

Also affecting county police protection is the low tax base in Pierce/Kitsap counties because of so many government installations which are non-tax paying. The law enforcement and parks get hit hardest. The U.S. government does reimburse funds for public education. One of the greatest demands for law enforcement is around the military bases and the county tax payers pay for it.

He is also concerned about improved public transportation for the area, including bus systems and possible Longbranch-Steilacoom passenger ferry service.

**LITTLE BY LITTLE**

Now that zucchini season is about over and you've exhausted your supply of recipes for using this most prolific of vegetables, let us pause a moment to consider how comparatively recent is its introduction into our gardens. Zucchini is not mentioned in any of my older cookbooks.

The pioneers used lots of Hubbard squash; it was a staple used all winter as a vegetable or often with honey, eggs and spices as a dessert. No doubt zucchini is a valuable food and it's economical. (One plant will provide all the squash a small family can use.) Zucchini is versatile - it's used in breads, cakes, cookies, soups, pickles, you name it.

Also zucchini contains practically no calories and it has a good amount of necessary vitamins and minerals.

Now for some things we had in the old days that have disappeared from our modern stores. Much food that is over-packaged today was sold in bulk when I was growing up in Spokane. We always bought brown sugar 20 lbs. at a time (kept in a big stone jar); ice cream was scooped out of a big freezer into a paper carton with wire handle; peanut butter and pickles the same; molasses came in a big can and was an economical sweetening for cakes and cookies.

Gingerbread was served often - was healthful and cheap. Now a small loaf of gingerbread would take a dollar's worth of molasses. Little wonder that modern children don't know what it is to come home from school and have a nice warm piece of gingerbread with their apple.

Years ago hobos were a very common sight especially if one lived on a farm or in a small town. When we lived on a farm in eastern Washington we never had to split wood - we depended entirely on getting it cut by one of the many tramps who stopped several times a week wanting to work for a meal.

My father often let them sleep in our barn (no smoking) at night and the thought of any danger never entered anyone's head.

I don't recall any crimes committed by hobos. They were just harmless wanderers. Have they disappeared entirely? Probably not, but the new breed is different. Recently a friend told me of his experience with a modern tramp. He noticed a roll of rug padding beside the road (route 16) and went over and gave it a kick.

To his surprise there was a young man rolled up inside, sound asleep. This was just a stone's throw from the Vaughn Post Office.

Don MacDonald represented County Commissioner Jake Bujacich, saying the commissioner was persuasive in helping the library to be located in this area.

The project is funded through a block grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development allocated by the County Commissioners through the Pierce County Office of Community Development.

The new 4000 sq. ft. library, replacing the present 800 sq. ft. branch at Vaughn is projected to be operational by next summer. John Austin Associates serves as architect, and James H. Robinson Construction Company of Bremerton is the general contractor on the library building.

The accepted construction bid was \$242,428, and total cost for the library phase of the project is estimated at about \$300,000 including planning and site preparation. Furnishings, equipment, staffing, and books and audiovisual materials will be funded by the Pierce County Library system which will operate the branch.

A meeting room will also be completed and available for library, health center and public use when the library goes into service.

Construction of the health center will begin after completion of the library, as second phase federal funding is received.

### PACKED HOUSE HEARS FORUM ON LAW ENFORCEMENT

On October 23rd over 300 people filled the Civic Center gym to hear the law enforcement facts presented by the sheriff's department and questions from the audience. Fern Bolyard, chairperson, was told by candidate Ron Hanna that this was the largest and most active turnout at any police meeting in the county.

Paul Fatland was the moderator. The guest speakers were: Jake Bujacich, County Commissioner, Representative Dan Dawson, Dave Seabrook, Undersheriff, Jim Sammons, Patrolman, Deputy David Adams, Legislator Art Galigan, Judge Frank Ruff, Rulon Bingham, Jim Penfield, Longbranch resident, Candidate Berva Luce, and Don Zimmerman.

There were many concerns raised by the audience including response time to police calls, our fair share of levy funds, drug control, lack of police coverage in areas of frequent crimes, and many others.

The protection agencies represented gave some very interesting statistics: There is 1/2 officer per 1000 residents in Tacoma and 1 officer for 6,000 on the Peninsula. Traffic controls are now being set up to release more

officers for crime control. Citizen participation is needed to have effective protection--calls to police on suspicious activity, crime-proofing your home, watching for your neighbors.

The Neighborhood Watch program is functioning. If you call 593-4930 in Tacoma, Deputy Ron Rousch will come to your home and describe what you can do to prevent crime. On Dec. 4 at 1:00 he will speak to the Senior Citizens at the Civic Center.

Much credit and many thanks go to Fern Bolyard who organized this very informative session. The Newsletter will be printing follow-up information that results from this meeting. The law enforcement agencies urge everyone to vote for Proposition #2 on Nov. 4 Because it will provide more funds for new staff.

The general feeling of the meeting was that positive steps can be taken to prevent crime with the cooperation and support of the citizens and agencies together. In the meantime, a Volunteer Trained Neighborhood Watch Program is being formed here, much like the Volunteer firefighters. Anyone interested in joining contact Fern Bolyard or Paul Fatland.

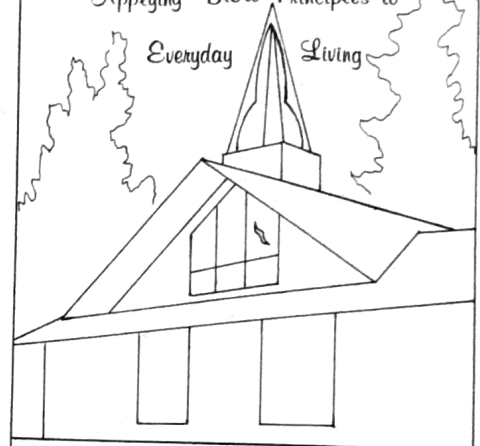

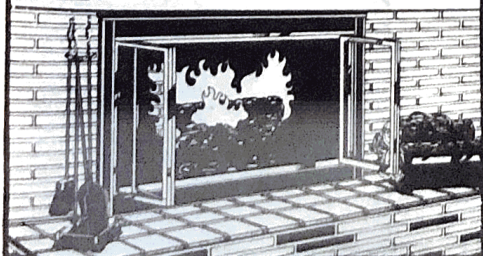
